Extra Credit: Watch a movie based on one of these books you read (read the book first) Write a critique including the following suggested questions.
Did the characters meet your expectations?
Did the movie follow the plot closely?
What were some main differences between the book and the movie?
Which did you like better? Why?
(Because a critique does not fit into a standard 3 point paragraph, you may disregard the format used for the required paragraphs above; however, use proper grammar rules.)

On the first day of school, you will turn in only the 2 read-a-Book plus reports and 2 final drafts of your compositions (on notebook paper). Also turn in the final draft of the critique if you choose to do one.

Use this outline form to guide you as you write a three-point expository paragraph:

Sentence 1: Topic (or thesis) sentence

Sentence 2: Listing sentence (the 3 points you will cover)

Sentence 3: State your first point

Sentence 4: Supporting sentence for point one (example or elaboration)

Sentence 5: Supporting sentence for point one (more specifics)

Sentence 6: State your second point

Sentence 7: Supporting sentence for point two

Sentence 8: Supporting sentence for point two

Sentence 9: State your third point

Sentence 10: Supporting sentence for point three

Sentence 11: Supporting sentence for point three

Sentence 12: Concluding sentence (should repeat or reflect topic and add a “zing”)

Be sure to indent and use the checklist below to help you edit your paragraph. Make sure you re-read your paragraph several times slowly.

Possible topics for your three-point paragraph:

- >Three adventures the main character had;
- >Three ways the book shows life in a historical period;
- >Three problems the characters faced;
- >Three ways the animal characters seemed like people;
- >Three things that make the book worth reading

Remember to use specific examples from the story in your supporting sentences

General checklist:

- 1) Have you followed the pattern for a 3-point paragraph?
- 2) Do you have complete sentences?
- 3) Have you capitalized the first word and put an end mark for every sentence?
- 4) Have you checked your sentences for capitalization and punctuation mistakes?
- 5) Have you varied your sentence structure?
